If you have a mobile phone you can insert a telephone number under the heading of ICE (In Case of an Emergency) in your contacts list. If needed, the emergency services can find this and call your friends or relations who may be worrying about your whereabouts.

Example . . . ICE Husband 01732 xxxxxx.

If you are on medication please have details of this with you as it can be very helpful to the emergency services if they know what medication you are taking .

Mobile Phones

In my last issue I wrote an item regarding the use of mobile phones being used by drivers while they were driving. It is still going on even though the fine is now £200 and six points on your licence.

I saw many drivers while travelling back from Lincolnshire recently using their phones while driving. One foreign lorry driver with a HGV2 lorry was not even looking at the road while he texted. I could clearly see him and was totally frightened as what could have happened if he had not looked up when he did. There would have been a terrible accident with no doubt many lives lost.

I asked for the readers of Watchout to send me their views on the use of mobile phones. I had a massive response with the main idea to stop this being to confiscate the phone and not give it back to the driver once they had been charged and the case against them proved. Many suggested the phone should be crushed as a car is if it has no tax or insurance. That may be a good deterrent as all their info, photos and call lists would just be wiped out. That they may make them realise they could wipe out someone's life or may have already done so.

Please talk to family members, friends and neighbourhood watch members about the dangers of using mobile phones while driving and if you can, warn youngsters in the community about this too. *ed!*

Police Cadets Help at Drop-In Centre

Border Force Makes Record Seizure of Guns

The largest single haul of handguns ever intercepted en route to Britain has been discovered stashed away in an old car engine as it entered the Channel Tunnel.

Border Force officials seized seventy nine pistols allegedly being ferried to gangland clients at the Tunnel entrance in France recently. Seven Polish citizens and a Czech man were arrested after the guns were found inside a hollowed-out Volvo engine block on the trailer of a yellow Mercedes van. The search of the vehicle followed intelligence from the National Crime Agency (NCA).

The haul, believed to have been destined for London, was said to be the biggest single confiscation in which all the firearms were handguns. This is apparently the choice for street gangs and other crime syndicates. Among them were Turkish built Flobert revolvers. The 4mm and 6mm weapons are smaller than the 9mm handguns more popular in criminal circles.

All handguns are banned in Britain. The smuggling attempt will cause particular

alarm after official figures showed a seven percent rise in firearms offences in the UK last year.

Graham Gardner the NCA's deputy director of investigations, said: "The weapons were small but lethal. We have never seen handguns in this number before."

Recently the NCA warned that more weapons were being smuggled into the country from mainland Europe. It also recorded the highest number of shootings since 2012-2013. There have also been more seizures of fully automatic weapons. This is extremely worrying but it is good to know that the government is spending £200,000 on a contract for independent experts to try to smuggle weapons into the Palace of Westminster to test security. Up to twenty-two covert tests will take place every month for five years.

Please be aware and report to the police anyone you see with a gun, or if you know of any youngsters carrying them. Do not approach them, just call the police.

What is Property Fraud?

Lynne Feddon from HM Land Registry's (HMLR) counter fraud team explains: "Property can be sold and mortgaged to raise money and can therefore be an attractive target for fraudsters. Often, fraudsters steal the real owners identity and then sell or mortgage the property by pretending to be them. If it isn't discovered promptly, the true property owner might find their property has been transferred or sold without their knowledge. Fixing the mess and getting any mortgage taken off the register can be distressing, time-consuming and costly. That's why we encourage all property owners to do what they can to minimise their risk of fraud."

While no system can eradicate fraud completely, since September 2009 HMLR has prevented property fraud totalling more than £92 million.

Who is most at risk from property fraud?

You are more at risk if your property is:

1. Rented out.
2. Empty, for example you are abroad or in a care home.
3. Mortgage free. Is not registered with HMLR.

If you think you may be the victim of property fraud, you should:

2. Contact a legal professional such as a solicitor or go to Citizens Advice.

What can you do to protect yourself?

Ensure your property is registered with HMLR so you can be compensated if you suffer financial loss from fraud.

The vast majority of properties in England and Wales are registered. Those likely to be unregistered are properties that have not changed hands or been re-mortgaged since 1990. If your property is not registered, then no compensation is payable.

Once you have registered your property, do make sure your details are updated and HMLR can reach you easily. You can have up to three addresses in the register including an e-mail address or an address abroad.

Sign up to HMLR's free property alert at <http://www.gov.uk/property-alert>.

If you then receive an alert you can judge whether the activity is suspicious and seek further advice.

Always notify HMLR if a registered owner has died especially if they are the sole owner.

Tougher Speeding Fines

Drivers caught speeding in England and Wales could face tougher penalties and fines up to £2,500 under new rules that came into force on 16th May 2017.

The changes mean that fines for the worst speeders will start at 150% of their weekly income, up from 100%.

This would apply to drivers who, for example drive at 41 mph or more in 20mph speed limit zone, 51 mph or more where there is a 30mph limit or over 101mph on a motorway. Sentence levels for less serious offences are not changing.

The maximum fine for speeding is £1,000 unless it takes place on a motorway, in which case it is £2,500. The number of points that you would receive is also increasing, as is the likelihood of you being disqualified from seven days up to fifty six days.

Remember to watch your speed and remember speed can kill !

Lock all windows and doors securely when you go out.

A timer switch is also a good idea if you are going on holiday.

Council calls on knitters to create Remembrance Day poppy display

A knitted poppy appeal has been launched in Tonbridge and Malling to commemorate Remembrance Day. Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council is working with the Royal British Legion to create a carpet of knitted or crocheted poppies and is inviting people to get out their knitting needles to support the project.

Thousands of knitted poppies will be needed to create a spectacular display, which will be unveiled at Tonbridge Castle on 27 October to mark the start of this year's official RBL poppy appeal. It is hoped that the poppy carpet can also be displayed at other points around the borough to mark Armistice Day (11 November) and Remembrance Sunday (12 November).

The Council is calling on the people of Tonbridge and Malling to get their wool and needles out and get knitting for this worthy community project. It is hoped that community groups, schools and

individuals will join in to make as many poppies as possible for the display.

Several other councils in Kent are also supporting the campaign by launching similar projects in their own districts.

Cllr Maria Heslop, Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Community Services, said: "It would be wonderful to see people taking up the challenge and knitting poppies. Whether you make just one or many, it will help to create a masterpiece for all to admire, as well as raising awareness of the Royal British Legion's annual poppy appeal and the tremendous work achieved through their fundraising."

Float to Live. Fight Your Instincts Not The Water

If you fall into the water unexpectedly, what do you do?

- A Swim.
- B Panic.
- C Float.

Many people would fight the effects of cold water by swimming hard or panicking—two potentially life threatening instincts that can quickly lead to drowning. Floating until the cold water shock passes could save your life.

As part of RNLI's Respect the Water drowning prevention campaign, we are urging people to fight their instincts, not the water and remember one simple skill – floating.

Learn to float. If you unexpectedly fall into cold water:

- 1 Fight your instinct to panic or swim hard.

- 2 Lean back in the water to keep your airway clear.
- 3 Push your stomach up, extending your arms and legs.
- 4 Gently move your hands and feet to help you float.
- 5 In 60-90 seconds you will be able to control your breathing.

What to do next.

Swim to safety. Call for help or continue to float until help arrives.

An estimated 372,000 people drown around the world every year, that is one life every 85 seconds, yet so many of these deaths are preventable.

FLOAT TO LIVE. Please tell as many people as possible of this technique especially children. It could help to save their lives.

Kent Police Now Using Drones

Kent Police is to add the use of drones to the many ways in which it keeps the county safe.

Officers have been trialling the unmanned aerial vehicles since 2015 and have consulted with other forces using drones to identify the benefits offered to day-to-day policing.

As a result, drones will now be used in Kent from Tuesday 6 June 2017.

The aerial units will be used to help officers locate vulnerable missing people before they come to harm.

They will also be used at some crime scenes and at serious road traffic collisions to provide officers with a better understanding of the terrain and evidential opportunities.

Drones will be operated by uniformed police officers who have received

appropriate training and use of the force's drones will be published on the public facing Kent Police website.

Superintendent Mat Newton said: "It is clear the use of drones in approved circumstances can improve the ability of officers to find missing people or get a better view of the scene of an incident.

"They will not replace police helicopters but can be used by officers during the early stages of an incident when a helicopter is not immediately available or their use is impractical.

"We have also given great consideration to the safety aspects of using drones as well as their operational capabilities and we firmly believe they will help us in delivering a first class service to the people of Kent."

Royal Mail Scam

Scammers are posting fake Royal Mail delivery cards through doors asking the recipients to call a number to arrange re-delivery of a parcel.

However, instead of speaking to the local postal depot, victims get through to fraudsters who try to get them to hand over personal data or bank details.

If you receive one of these cards, it is best to go straight to your local Post Office depot to check this is real and not a scam card you have received. Please warn any elderly members in your neighbourhood watch schemes about this scam.
